Students at the Panamerican Institute receive technical training that will help them acquire jobs in the business world.

The Panamerican Institute is a fully accredited Mexican technical school founded by Rev. Edgar Welty in 1962. The Institute prepares deprived teenagers for jobs that would otherwise be out of their reach. Currently, the school provides a free secondary education for 75 students from Tijuana. President Juana Santos and most of the teachers are graduates of the Institute. Other teachers work half-days at the school, and in return, are awarded scholarships to continue their education at the University of Tijuana.

The school building has three classrooms, a science laboratory-computer lab, a library, and an office. Here, the students are taught to read and write English as well as learn basic computer and clerical skills, including bookkeeping, filing, and documentation. They learn how to compute currency in the American money system. There are classes in history and science as well. All of these skills will make employment highly probable upon graduation. Though Mexico does not allow religious education in their public schools, the faculty at the Pan American Institute studies the Bible to better convey Christian values and ethics, by lifestyle and example.

The school has wonderful opportunities for personal connections with the students. Besides the Adopt-A-Student Program, there are funds needed for uniforms, textbooks, school meals, and bus fare for those living at a distance. At Christmas, a program to give each student a Christmas Basket is an ongoing project. There are "mission trip" opportunities available for groups of volunteers to maintain and improve the campus.
