As a young pastor he saw that church growth was mostly a "circulation of the saints" as his own generation no longer saw the church as a meaningful response to the unravelling of Western societies.

As a teacher, writer, and consultant he sought to address the question of being the church in a massive unravelling. Those experiences convinced him that the Spirit is fermenting a movement of God's people than can no longer be contained in narratives of renewal, reform, or the fixing existing systems.

Alan has worked with congregations and denominational systems around the world. He is co-leader of the podcast *Leaving Egypt*. 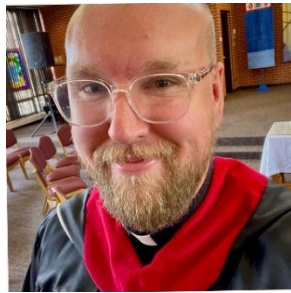
As a self-published author, producer, poet, Stephy loves the spoken word and has written 5 books, with

PLENARIES / WORKSHOPS

WHERE ARE WE AND WHAT HAPPENED

Three Sessions:

Session One: Leaders and the people in our congregations are disoriented and confused. They now know there is no going back to normal even though many are still trying hard to make things work again. People want to know: What happened? Where are we? How did we get to this place for which little has prepared us? This session describes what has been happening and the unraveling that now confronts us. It describes a powerful story that has been shaping our churches and societies - a story that worked for a very long time but is now unraveling.

Session Two responds to the question leaders keep asking when they respond to session 1: What do we do? This session shares why this is the wrong question to be asking. It proposes that we need to ask a fundamentally different question: In Scripture and our traditions, how has God turned up with God's people when they have found themselves in disruption and unraveling? To do this we turn to Scripture.

Session Three proposes that our response to Session 2 is in how we cultivate communities of hope in a place we've never been before. It proposes three practices for forming communities of hope in a dark time: *Dwelling*, *Discerning* and *Exploring*.

Telling stories, shared leadership, and shared ministry all help us “do church.” This workshop will use the story about the Road to Emmaus (Luke 24:13-35) as a way of weaving these skills together to inspire greater collaboration and empowerment among clergy and laity. We imagine the road to Emmaus as a somber, contemplative, anxious journey. When this workshop ends, the hope is that participants will be inspired by the road *from* Emmaus – that moment after Christ has been made known to them and they run *from* Emmaus, back to Jerusalem to tell their friends what had transpired.

BEING A CHRISTIAN NEIGHBOR IN A MULTI-FAITH WORLD | Rev. Beth McCaw / Rev. Samuel Felderman – University of Dubuque **Presented by Growth Ministry Council**

In a world increasingly divided, what does it mean to live our Christian discipleship faithfully while inhabiting community with our neighbors of other faiths?
