Hotel Information

We are meeting from June 2024 for our Annual Meeting & Conference at THE CENTENNIAL HOTEL in Spokane, Washington. All guest rooms include a coffee maker / tea service, a microwave, and a refrigerator. A Lobby Espresso Bar is open from 6am-11am daily. The Centennial Restaurant offers breakfast, lunch, and dinner. OUR SPEAKERS

Alan Roxburgh lives in an extended household in Vancouver, Canada with his wife and two poodles. He's an avid hiker, cyclist and cook when not reading books. Alan has served as pastor, seminary professor and consultant on leadership and missional transformation to church systems around the world. He has written 14 books on themes of missional life, leadership, and culture change within the church. He grew up in the inner city of Liverpool, immigrated to Canada as a teenager. As a young pastor he saw that church growth was mostly a "circulation of the saints" as his own generation no longer saw the church as a meaningful response to the unravelling of Western societies. As a teacher, writer, and consultant he sought to address the question of being the church in a massive unravelling. Those experiences convinced him that the Spirit is fermenting a movement of God's people than can no longer be contained in narratives of renewal, reform, or the fixing existing systems. Alan has worked with congregations and denominational systems around the world. He is co-leader of the podcast Leaving Egypt. Currently, he is co-directing a major research project on the question of Christian life and economics in an age of unraveling.

Stephy Nobles-Beans is an Educator, Professor, Assistant Pastor, Campus Pastor, Speaker, Associate Chaplain for Diversity, Equity, & Inclusion in Campus Ministries at Whitworth University. Her passion is leadership and to help women step into their calling of leadership and vocation, and to help build the Kingdom of God. As a self-published author, producer, poet, Stephy loves the spoken word and has written 5 books, with her newest authored work, "Born To Be A Boss, Brown Skin Girls Lead Too," a resourceful tool designed to help women of color to create their own narrative. She is always ready to encourage, empower, and equip women for leadership, especially women of color. She has been called "Daughter of Thunder."

The Rev. Dr. Ned Allyn Parker is the Associate Dean of Institutional Advancement for Andover Newton Seminary at Yale Divinity School. He is also an ordained minister with the American Baptist Churches and served churches in Newton, MA, and Seattle, WA. He regularly leads workshops on the intersection of storytelling and leadership for churches and organizations. Ned and his dog Lucky are currently training JR, the new puppy of the household, to be an upstanding member of the canine community.

Rev. Dr. Beth McCaw, DMin, serves as associate professor of ministry at the University of Dubuque Theological Seminary, as dean of the seminary and vice president of the university. McCaw began her faithful service to UDTS nearly 20 years

ago. She also serves on the Wendt Character Initiative's Advisory Board. Recently, she was a major author on a proposal that received \$1.25 million from Lilly Endowment Inc. to help establish Plentiful Gifts: Nourishing Members for the Flourishing of Small Member Congregations. The NACCC is an inaugural partner in the grant.

Samuel J. Felderman, Director of Seminary Admissions at University of Dubuque, earned a Bachelor's degree in Philosophy and Religious Studies at University of Dubuque.

Carol Seppilu was born and raised on St Lawrence Island. As a Siberian Yupik, she lives in Nome, Alaska. Her love for nature is evident in how she spends much of her time outdoors. She shares her story with the hope of inspiring others.

Rev. Dr. Dietra Wise Baker (Washington Gladden) currently serves as the Director of Contextual Education and Visiting Professor of Community Engagement at Eden Theological Seminary. She is the Founding Faculty Director of The Center of Lived Faith & Organizing. She has matriculated through post-secondary, where she earned the following: Bachelor of Science from Howard University, Master of Divinity from Eden Theological Seminary and Doctor of Ministry in Preaching from Aquinas Institute of Theology.

Amana Talala Mbise - Since joining the First Congregational Church of Anchorage in 2019, Amana has been an active member serving as chair of the worship ministry, a board member of the Dancing Owls Learning Center (a proposed after school program to serve the children of the University of Alaska Anchorage students) and playing in the handbells choir. He is also a member of the Mission and Outreach Ministry Council and served on the NACCC Racial Justice Task Team. Outside FCC, Amana works as an Assistant Professor of Social Work at the University of Alaska Anchorage. He brings over ten years of experience in social work, global health, and community development in Tanzania, Denmark, and the US. His research interests center around immigration, human trafficking, and rights-based approaches to social work. Currently, he is leading the first health needs assessment for Black-Identifying Alaskans in collaboration with the Alaska Black Caucus.

Rev. Richard Miller-Todd, Congregational Church, Berwick, Iowa - Rich's involvement with missions began as a child when his dad led the Piedmont College summer camp and worked with their thrift shop. Upon graduating from seminary, he was a student leader for the Odyssey 80' Program (South Church, Hartford), a mission tour to several countries. With International Congregational Fellowship, he traveled to conferences in Greece, Great Britain, South Korea, Brazil, Argentina, and the United States. Rev. Miller-Todd has visited and worked at NA missions abroad and at Hosanna Industries and Morgan Scott in the US. Missionary efforts are a part of who Rich is. He sees that missions have given life to their church.
