## **Course Descriptions**

### Course #1: Contextual Biblical Applications

Dates: September & October

**Course Description:** In today's world many question the relevance of Scripture for their lives; this is as true within the church as without. This course will help learners address congregants' concerns (e.g., finances, sickness, conflict, death) and societal issues (e.g., racial justice, culture, sexual identity, and immigration) through the application of Scripture. Participants will have the opportunity to engage in these topics in class through lectures, discussion, and student presentations.

### Course #2: Advanced Preaching and Teaching

Dates: November

**Course Description:** "Dear God, please help me prepare and deliver a sermon that will be faithful to You, hold the attention of my audience, and by the grace of Your Spirit, be a humble instrument of Your work in their lives."

Not difficult, what? This course will focus on how to build, shape, and sermons in the context of God's call on the preacher.

Participants will learn the components of excellent preaching as they prepare and preach messages of their own, receiving constructive feedback from their classmates and instructor. Various learning approaches - including lectures, discussions, and recordings - will help develop and enhance preaching abilities.

The course's practical nature includes theology, taking into account several elements the preacher should consider. These include responsible handling of the biblical text; the concerns and vitality of the local Church; and the preacher's own personality, style, and world view.

#### Course #3: Advanced Pastoral Care and Pastoral Ethics

Dates: December

**Course Description:** This course builds upon the curriculum from the Essentials of Pastoral Care and Pastoral Ethics course, and it assumes students are versed in the fundamental skills needed for providing effective pastoral care, and in an ethical way. This course, then, will engage students to apply their learnings through contextual application. Students will have opportunities to reflect critically upon pastoral care visits and will consider their competencies, formational needs, and theological orientation through this process. Students will share their reflections in the group setting to facilitate feedback, shared learning, and peer-to-peer support.

### Course #4: Leadership Effectiveness and Spiritual Gifts

Dates: January

**Course Description:** This course will explore the relationship of spiritual gifts to the church organized around the headship of Christ and the ministry of all believers. Participants will seek to define the nature of spiritual gifts, their own giftedness, and how they might lead a congregation to develop and apply members' individual and collective gifts to ministry, including the use of available materials to identify and explain spiritual gifts.

#### Course #5: Sabbath and Self Care in Ministry

**Dates:** February

**Course Description:** This class will cover Sabbath, self-care in pastoral work, and have an introduction to trauma. The instructor will use the Bible (NIV version), and the books suggested to develop and understanding of these topics and their relevance in students lives and the live of the people they are serving.

**Course Description:** This class provides an overview to the broad sweep of the religious traditions of the world. Each student should become better equipped to be part of the modern world by understanding and treating with respect adherents of other faith traditions.

# **Course Descriptions**

#### Course #7: Practical Ministry Experience

Dates: April to mid-June

**Course Description:** During the third and final year of the Lay Ministry Training Program, students have the opportunity to put all that they have learned over the previous years about scripture, church history, theology, spirituality, ethics, missional perspectives, and Congregationalism into practice, along with their developed knowledge and skills in preaching, leadership, management, conflict transformation, worship, and pastoral care, among other areas, through a supervised ministry experience.

While time during the spring of this third year is made available for this with no set classes scheduled, students and their ministerial supervisors that are approved ahead of time by the administrators of the Lay Ministry Training Program can plan for this to occur at points throughout the year. This is to be done in the student's primary context for ministry.

Documentation by both student and supervisor is submitted at the end of the academic year to demonstrate successful completion of this aspect of their education.
